The children have enjoyed lots of exciting trips, which have all supported our curriculum. We have welcomed some very special visitors to our school for assemblies and workshops to enrich learning.

The school has been involved in important fundraising events to raise money for some very special charities. The charities you chose to support this year were: Great Ormond Street Hospital, Crest and UNICEF.

Our hard working P.T.A, has put on some wonderful events to raise much needed funds for our school, any money raised will go towards extra equipment/treats for all the children. We have also received some very generous donations from local businesses, for example, Ford and Morrisons.





September

September saw the beginning of a new selection of after school clubs for Year 1.

We had our first ever cookery club. The children enjoyed making a variety of foods and were eager to discover which healthy recipes they were going to make next.

In November 2016, Newton Class also visited the Sri Karpaga Vinayagar Temple to support their Religious Education Studies, whilst Darwin Class visited the Grow Wild Centre in Lloyd Park for the first time.

We are very proud to represent so many cultures and religions here at Walthamstow Primary Academy and we endeavour to engage in the religious celebrations with our families. In November, we celebrated Diwali by making some colourful art work and holding a special assembly to share what we had learnt in our Religious Education lessons.

We are also very proud to be British and ensure we celebrate our British values, not forgetting those who sacrificed their lives for our freedom. On Remembrance Day, we all wore something red.





<u>October</u>

In October 2016, Darwin Class (Reception) enjoyed trips to The Emmanuel Community Church and Sri Karpaga Vinayagar Temple. These trips supported their Religious Education studies for this term.

October also saw the start of regular visits to the Grow Wild Centre in Lloyd Park. The children love visiting the Grow Wild centre, as they have the opportunity to get muddy, explore, and learn about the outside habitat of insects and mini beasts.





November

Year 1 learnt about the painter Monet and produced some of their own fantastic art work in his styles, which they shared in an assembly for parents and carers.



December

December

It was a busy month for entertainment at Walthamstow Primary Academy; our Reception and Year 1 children put on a wonderful performance of Christmas Carols, for their families, which was followed by some delicious mince pies.

Staff from Walthamstow Academy, our neighbouring secondary school, entertained us with a pantomime that was enjoyed by all of the children and staff. A big thank you to everyone at Walthamstow Academy for making us feel so welcome.

On the last day of term, we were treated to a fabulous theatre production at Mirth, Marvel and Maud, in Walthamstow where we watched a performance about Grimms' Fairy Tales.

We held a very successful community supper where we invited Governors, staff, the children and their families along to bring one of their favourite dishes that represented their culture, to share with everyone. It was a lovely evening that made way for making new friends and getting to know other families from Walthamstow Primary Academy.













<u>January</u>

The beginning of a new calendar year started with International Week. During this week, Darwin Class studied Portugal and The Caribbean. The children coloured in flags, researched information using iPads and took part in traditional culture - Portuguese folk dancing, carnival celebrations and cooking up some dumplings. They learnt many facts, such as, the different countries that make up The Caribbean, the capital city of Portugal, and the children even made their own weather forecasts based on different countries. It was a great introduction to the start of a new term!



Newton Class explored Pakistan and Sri Lanka. As one of their activities, they used a green screen app on their iPad to pretend they were at different locations. The children learnt that both Sri Lanka and Pakistan's national sports are cricket. The children had pictures taken with elephants, Adam's Peak and Sigiriya Rock in Sri Lanka!









We also welcomed some special visitors to our school to talk to us about water safety and to teach the children about Judaism. Rabbi Wollenberg shared facts and artefacts about the Jewish faith. The children really enjoyed his visit. Thank you, Rabbi Wollenberg!

Canal River Explorers presented a special assembly to Reception and Year 1 where we looked at a picture of a river and identified the possible hazards around it. We learnt that when we are around open water it is important to read and follow the signs that we see. We learnt that we should stay away from the edge, even if we drop something in. We were taught that if we see someone in danger in the water, we have to call

January finished in style with a special 'Chinese New Year' assembly and a week of exploring the story behind this celebration. Newton Class explored the twelve animal representations of each year. They reenacted the story and developed a short play. They then explored the craft of Chinese paper and created their own red Roosters, which is the animal representation for this year. In Art, the children looked at sculptures and collaboratively created a dragon, and learnt that dragons are a symbol of celebration in the Chinese culture.

February

February didn't disappoint; the weather may have been cold and uninviting, but we welcomed many interesting learning opportunities.

During Internet Safety Week, we encouraged all parents and carers to speak to their children about how to keep safe online. We sent home a Digital Parenting magazine, which had lots of helpful information.

Newton Class enjoyed another trip to Lloyd Park and we were very excited to receive a special delivery of living eggs. Ten eggs were delivered and set up in their incubator to keep warm. When they were ready, much to the delight of the children when they came back to school in the morning, some of the chicks had hatched from their eggs. All of the children had the opportunity to hold a chick. The chicks were re-homed at the end of their stay with us.

February



February continued to offer some special visitors and we welcomed the RSPB!

The children learnt about different types of birds and went out to find evidence of minibeasts, plants and trees. We used binoculars and magnifying glasses to hunt for these creatures in our local environment.

Some children took part in a Royal Mail Christmas Stamp design competition. We produced some lovely, colourful designs, but, unfortunately, none were shortlisted.

A very busy February ended with decorating some scrumptious pancakes to celebrate Pancake Day.















March

March offered an array of trips, visits, activities and dressing up days.

We started with World Book Day, where all the staff and the children dressed up as their favourite book character. We were surrounded by superheroes and fairy tale characters! We raised £26.00.





When we came back from half term, we received a very precious parcel; some caterpillars for the children to watch transform into beautiful butterflies.





Both classes were taught a very special P.E. lesson by the sports ambassadors from Walthamstow Academy. The children used the facilities and equipment provided by Walthamstow Academy and thoroughly enjoyed a different P.E. Lesson!

Darwin Class visited the London Transport Museum. They were able to explore the Museum, seeing different types of vehicles, old and new. The children had a session with a Museum expert, who took us on a journey through olden day London. They learnt about the first ever London bus, called the Omnibus, which was run by horses! They learnt about all types of buses, including the modern London Buses and the new Route Masters. The children searched the Museum for stamps to show a timeline of all the things they had discovered and then took a journey home on the London Underground. It was great fun and was a valuable addition to our topic on Transport.









March

The students from Leyton Sixth Form College, where our Vice Chair of the Local Governing Body is Principal, invited all our staff and children to watch a performance they had written, arranged and acted in.

Our children said:

'I liked the wolves because they were funny'. 'The pigs were silly'. 'I liked the second part because there was more arguing'. 'I thought it was good because the wolf was really scary'. 'I thought it was really fun'.

'I liked the dancing and the singing'. 'I liked all the characters'. 'I thought the queen was special'. 'I liked the character Queen Moonlight because she had a crown'. 'Really good'. 'Showed us good stuff'. 'Showed us respect'. 'I learnt about different talents'.

And some from the teachers:

'I really enjoyed the way the characters engaged with our children'. 'LSC did an amazing job at aiming the play at our age group'. 'LSC students are lucky to have such fantastic facilities'. 'I felt as if everyone really wanted us to be there and they made us feel so welcome'.









You could be forgiven for thinking that we couldn't possibly handle any more excitement in the spring term, but, you would be wrong!

Once again the children were treated to another visitor; we were delighted to watch a wonderful performance from 'Shaking up Shakespeare'. This performance was thoroughly entertaining and enjoyed by all the children and staff. Our workshop focused on The Tempest, the play we were studying in Reception and Year 1 as part of our topic on Shakespeare.





March

We celebrated Red Nose Day in style and, for a donation, the children came to school dressed in something red.

At the end of March we had an Easter Bonnet Parade to celebrate Easter. All the children and their families worked so hard to make amazing Easter Bonnets. We gave out a prize for the best Easter Bonnet in each class.









April

In April, Miss Nunes and Newton Class worked very hard to produce a wonderful piece of art to take part in the '1000 swifts over Walthamstow' art trail.

Walthamstow is getting a wetland - the biggest urban wetland in Europe. Although the land belongs to Thames Water, the wetland has been created with public funds and it is part of our cultural commons. To celebrate the opening of the Wetlands and the new gallery that is being created in the old Engine House, '1000 Swifts over Walthamstow' has been created. Swifts are iconic to the reservoirs, but they are also at risk as they are losing their nesting places in urban development. To be part of the flock, Year 1 made their own beautiful and unique swifts from recycled materials.



April was also the time to say 'bon voyage' to our butterflies.

The children gained so much knowledge about the life cycle of the butterfly and they used the experiment to enhance the Year 1 science topic.





May

In May 2017, during Drama Week we decided to extend an invitation to the students of Leyton Sixth Form College to perform for us again here at Walthamstow Primary Academy. The students and staff all went out of their way to travel here and put on an interactive performance of Little Red Riding Hood for our pupils.





We also had a visit from Reverend Stella Olukanmi from St Andrew's Church. Reverend Stella answered some questions about Christianity and she told us about the Bible and the Last Supper, when Christians believe that Jesus and his friends had a meal of bread and wine. Reverend Stella left us with some resources to use in future Religious Education lessons.

Darwin Class visited the London Sea Life Centre in May as part of their topic 'Under the sea'. The children read a story with Marley the turtle, who then took the children to tea with the underwater animals. They met some sharks, penguins, an octopus and some jelly fish. They had an amazing time!





In Newton Class, the children were studying the lifecycle of sunflowers in June. They planted their own seeds so they could investigate how the plants grow and change. It was a fierce competition to see whose would be the tallest.











May

May finished with a flurry!

To support one of our families we decided to hold a non-uniform day and we invited all the children and their favourite teddy bears to Walthamstow Primary Academy's Teddy Bears, Picnic. The children had a healthy snack and enjoyed some teddy bear stories. This was to raise money for a wonderful charity, Great Ormond Street Hospital. The Carey family hold an annual Fun Run, we wanted to get involved too! Miss de Silva, Ms Perisic and several children went along to support the Carey family. WPA raised a wonderful £84.00, which went towards an outstanding total of £1675 donated to GOSH.





Throughout the year, for a whole day for each half term, we have welcomed a dance, drama and story telling workshop to our school - Big Foot.

The wonderful team at Big Foot have provided the children with the opportunity to express themselves through movement and singing.

June






We further support our families by offering meetings with external healthcare providers, who advise parents and carers about medical concerns.

Some P.T.A. events include:


- Mother's day breakfast, Morrisons provided us with the food and the drink for this event thank you!
